3. My child is happy at this school

Points to note - the school's vision of 'In all that we do our values shine through' focuses our attention on enabling all children to flourish and thrive, enjoying their learning and their whole school experience. Ofsted (2024) state: '... pupils feel valued. They enjo y school, feel safe and have many opportunities to do lots of different things..' (0 point)





4. My child feels safe at this school

Points to note - the school takes safeguarding extremely seriously. All staff and governors undertake regular safeguarding trainin g, and the school has recently introduced a new safeguarding recording system. Ofsted (2024) state: 'The arrangements for safe guarding are effective ... pupils feel valued. They enjoy school, feel safe .' (0 point)



5. The school makes sure its pupils are well behaved

Points to note - throughout their time at school, children are learning how to behave responsibly; as they learn, they also make mistakes, as is human nature. Anecdotal evidence from external sources suggest that the children's behaviour and learning beha viours are both excellent - we often receive very positive feedback from places we have visited. Ofsted (2024) state: 'pupils are ki nd to one another. Older pupils look out for younger ones, and all learn the value of kind words and actions. Typically, pupils' be haviour is excellent. However, if any upsets do happen, then the school responds promptly and fairly..' SIAMS (2019) state: 'Behaviour is excellent and universally attributed to the school's vision and values.' 6. My child has been bullied and the school dealt with the bullying quickly and effectively

Points to note - bullying is defined as STOP (Several Times On Purpose) and actively targeted towards an individual. It is not a on e-off incident in the playground. The school's Peer-on-Peer Abuse Policy can be found on the school website for further informat ion. Ofsted (2024) state: 'Typically, pupils' behaviour is excellent. However, if any upsets do happen, then the school responds pro mptly and fairly. Pupils and their parents and carers have confidence that leaders and staff will always listen to them and help the m when needs be.' (0 point)



7. The school makes me aware of what my child will learn during the year

Points to note - detailed curriculum planning can be found on the school website for each class and each curriculum subject. point)



8. When I have raised concerns with the school, they have been dealt with properly

Points to note - the school continues to offer an 'open door policy' in order to promote positive relationships and communicatio n between school and home. Mr Debenham and Mrs Mealand can be sought on the playground before and after school, and ap pointments can be made with class teachers to discuss any parental concerns. Ofsted (2024) state: 'Pupils and their parents and c arers have confidence that leaders and staff will always listen to them and help them when needs be.' SIAMS (2019) state:' Parent s speak of how the teachers care about the whole family.' (0 point)

Ofsted (2024) state: 'At this inclus ive school, pupils with special educational needs and/or disabilities are supported to succeed. Indeed, the school has a proven tr ack record in building pupils' confidence and self-belief so they can overcome challenges and make the most of school..' (0 poin t)

The school works tirelessly to provide numero us opportunities for all children's lights to shine, whether it be through music, sport, academic achievements etc. Ofsted (2024) state: 'Across the curriculum, pupils get a lot of work done. They take pride in their achievements and enjoy their lessons. In add ition, the school provides opportunities beyond classroom learning.' (0 point)

Points to note - two Parents' Evenings are held each year, alongside annual reports; appointments with teachers can be booked during the year to discuss any particular concerns, through the school's open door policy. Ofsted (2024) state: 'Parents and pupi Is speak highly of the leadership, education and care provided at Eardisley School. They describe it as a very welcoming place wi th highly caring and visible leadership. Inspection evidence supports these views.' (0 point)





13. There is a good range of subjects available to my child at this school

Points to note - the school covers all the National Curriculum subject areas, and detailed curriculum planning can be found on t he school website. Ofsted (2024) state: 'The school's work to support pupils' wider development is another area of strength. Thi s is evident in the many extra activities that broaden pupils' interests and teach them about the world beyond rural Herefordshir e. Pupils visit urban centres and have a voice in local, regional and national matters. This includes sharing their ideas with gover nment in orderto help shape national policies. Sport, music, theatre and performance also support pupils' cultural awareness.' (0 point)





14. My child can take part in clubs and activities at this school

Points to note - Swallows Club is open to all children each day. The school aims to offer a wide range of opportunities through i ts extra-curricular activities; the school ensures that no child needs to miss out on extra-curricular activities through financial co ncerns. SIAMS (2019) state:' There are wide-ranging extra-curricular activities.' (0 point)

Older pupils look out for younger ones, a nd all learn the value of kind words and actions. 17. My child is making enough progress at this school

Points to note - the school continues to have high expectations of all children and aims to support each child so that they can f ulfil their potential and flourish. Parents are informed of their child's progress through Parents' Evenings and the annual school r eport. School leaders analyse Pupil Progress data rigorously each half term to quickly pick up any child who is making less than expected progress - interventions, such as focussed groups and SEND interventions, may then be put in place to address any co ncerns. Ofsted (2024) state: 'Academic standards are typically strong, and pupils study a broad and rich curriculum in many diffe rent subjects. They learn much and are well prepared for secondary school.' (0 point)





18. The school helps my child to have a healthy lifestyle

Points to note - the school offers numerous opportunities for children to lead an active lifestyle, through PE and swimming less ons, after school sports' clubs, sporting fixtures and active playtimes. School dinners adhere to stringent national food nutrition al standards and are reviewed regularly. (0 point)





19. The school has a strong Christian ethos

Points to note - the school is rightly proud of its strong connection with Eardisley Church and Hereford Diocese. Being a church school is of great value to all involved. The Christian distinctiveness of the school is regularly reviewed by school leaders and go vernors. SIAMS (2019) state: 'The school's deeply held Christian vision permeates every aspect of the school so that it has a very positive impact on its work in Eardisley and beyond.' (0 point)





20. The governors are effective in supporting the school

Points to note - school governors take an extremely active role in the life of the school, meeting regularly throughout the year t o monitor, support and challenge all areas of school life. Governors regularly attend school events and are accessible directly to parents at Parents' Evenings. Ofsted (2024) state: 'Governors are well informed about their role and are very active in their supp ort for the school. Together with school leaders, they are ambitious for every pupil and have created a supportive and open cult ure.' (0 point)
