We measure the impact of our curriculum by: • Assessing children's understanding of topic linked vocabulary before and after the unit is taught. • Images and videos of the children's practical learning.

Where practicable, this is linked to other areas of study to enable children to make meaningful connections with other subject knowledge and skills. Outdoor learning is incorporated as often as possible.

Art lessons are taught in subject lessons or in blocks on a half-termly basis in line with our Spiral Framework, and involve studying the work of other artists, personal experience, experimentation and practice and completing a variety of final pieces.

Evidence of art work is collected in the art sketch book which follows children from Year One through the school.

Where appropriate, we engage in community opportunities – such as the Herefordshire H. Art exhibitions and by having ongoing displays in our local church to display and celebrate children's work.

- Interviewing the pupils about their learning (pupil voice).
- Moderation staff meetings where pupil's books are scrutinised and there is the opportunity for a dialogue between teachers to understand their class's work.
- Annual reporting of standards across the curriculum.
- Marking of work in books.
